##### Count nouns

an egg → eggs  
 a sandwich → sandwiches

Do we need **any** eggs?  
 Yes. Let's get **some** (eggs).  
 No. We **don't** need **any** (eggs).

##### Noncount nouns

bread  
 lettuce

Do we need **any** bread?  
 Yes. Let's get **some** (bread).  
 No. We **don't** need **any** (bread).
