6 my, your, her, his ... : possessive adjectives

That's my daughter. Is this vour book? This is **her** office. I've got **their** phone number.

Personal pronouns		Possessive adjectives
I you	→ →	my your
she he	→	her his
it	→	its
we they	→	our their

Notes

• my, your, her, his, its, our, their do not change. They are the same with singular and plural nouns: I like **their** car.

Here's my book.

I like **their** cars.

Here are **my** books.

The possessive *its* has no apostrophe ('): The cat likes **its** food. NOT The cat likes it's food.
