In any case, the demonstratives are fundamental as a method to give cohesion to the texts.

These pronouns are classified according to the degree of distance they have with the indicated object.

 Demonstrative pronouns of the first degree indicate a closeness of the aforementioned with respect to the issuer: ("this", "these", "this", "these").
 For example: "These (books) look very old", "This (tray) belonged to my grandmother."

 Demonstrative pronouns of the second degree, on the other hand, express the closeness of what is indicated with respect to the receiver: ("that", "that", "those", "those").
 For example: "Give me that, please", "In that place they sell very nice clothes."

 Finally, third degree demonstrative pronouns denote closeness for the sender and the receiver ("that", "that", "that", "those", "those").
 For example: "Those seem used." "That drawing was made by my cousin"

1 This/these; it/they; plurals

- Don't use a contraction with What + are: What are these? (Not: What're these?)
- Use this with singular nouns: This is a book. Use these with plural nouns: These are earrings.
