Possessive Pronouns.

A pronoun is a word that replaces a noun in a sentence, making the subject a person or a thing. Possessive pronouns are pronouns that demonstrate ownership, showing that something belongs to a particular someone.

Possessive pronouns include my, mine, our, ours, its, his, her, hers, their, theirs, your and yours. These are all words that demonstrate ownership. If the book belongs to me, then it is mine. If the book belongs to her, then it is hers.

EXAMPLES

The kids are <u>yours</u> and <u>mine</u>. The house is <u>theirs</u> and its paint is flaking. The money was really <u>theirs</u> for the taking.
