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### Ex. Using third persons

The simple present is a **verb tense** with two main uses. We use the simple present tense when an action is happening right now, or when it happens regularly (or unceasingly, which is why it's sometimes called present indefinite). Depending on the person, the simple present tense is formed by using the root form or by adding -s or -es to the end.

- Emily has a dog Pitbull.
- Mariana and Bertha cooks chicken.
- Brandon has a candy.
- Alberto wears a T-shirt.
- Victoria loves to Armando.
- Felipe drinks dinner.
- Quike travels for every México.
- Amy runs in the park.
- Emilio jumps a lot.
- Kevin studies Spanish.
- Antonio needs a book.
- They have an emergency.
- Carmen dances in the afternoon.
- Flor plays a game.
- Lia dreams every night.
