uses. We use the simple present tense when an

action is happening right now, or when it happens

regularly (or unceasingly, which is why it's sometimes

called present indefinite). Depending on the person,

the simple present tense is formed by using the root



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- Faby and her brothers do not sleep now.
- Carmelo and Frida do not eat donuts.
- I do not go to church today.
- The boys do not watch T.V.
- Lalo and Amin do not wash clothes.
- I do not swim.
- Susan's friends do not write a letter.
- They do not laugh.
- I do not have a bovfriend.

Ex. Negative with "does not"

- Fernando does not fly.
- The dog does not have a pet.
- Imelda does not give C.

- Key does not forgive to Sam.
- Juan does not talk about love.
- Samantha does not sit.
- Monse does not learn French.
- Julia does not clean his room.
