> **SUBJECT + "WILL" + MAIN VERB.**

- 1. I **will call** you tonight.



- 2. She **will arrive** late.



- 3. They **will be** happy to see you



- I sleep during the day.
- You read a lot of stories.
- We drive airplanes.
- They build a house.
- I feed the pigeons.

AFFIRMATIVE SENTENCES (THIRD PERSON)



- He eats biscuits.
- She washes in the river.
- He works at night.
- She sings at the opera.
- He smokes all day.

He likes snakes.	He doesn't like snakes.	She likes chocolate.	She doesn't like chocolate.
It likes bones.	It doesn't like bones.	It likes bones.	It doesn't like bones.

QUESTIONS	SHORT ANSWERS
+ You like chocolate.	Yes, I do.
? Do you like chocolate?	No, I don't.
+ She likes chocolate.	Yes, she does.
? Does she like chocolate?	No, she doesn't.

DO INTERROGATIVE AUXILIARY

The interrogative form

The interrogative form of normal verbs

For 'normal' (non-auxiliary) verbs the interrogative is formed with the auxiliary **do - does - did**

Does she like flowers? Do they speak English? Did you see the news last night?

The interrogative form of auxiliary verbs

If the verb is an auxiliary the interrogative is formed without **do - does - did**

Are they at home? Has he read the book yet? Were they in Venice last week?

Did you go to school yesterday?



Note: when replying to a question we often repeat the auxiliary only as the rest of the sentence is understood by the person asking the question.

Yes, I did.



- Do you walk a lot?
- Do we teach English at school?
- Do they agree to be smart?
- Do you help your mother to clean your house?
- Do We want to be engineers?

DOES INTERROGATIVE AUXILIARY

YES / NO QUESTIONS	
Am	Am I at home? Am you a student?
Is	Is he in the park? Is she a teacher?
Are	Are they at school? Are you happy?
Has	Has he finished his homework? Has she visited her parents?
Have	Have you seen the new movie? Have they moved to a new house?

- Does he teach how to weave?
- Does she study for her subject?
- Does he miss his girlfriend?
- Does she speak italian at home?
- Does he clean his soccer shoes?
