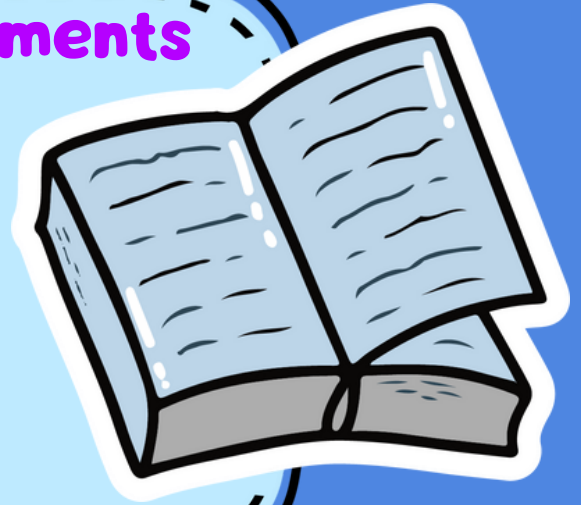

SIMPLE PRESENT

Simple present statements

I walk to school.
 You ride your bike to school.
 He works near here.
 She takes the bus to work.

don't = do not
 doesn't = does not



Simple present statements irregular verbs

► In affirmative statements, verbs with he/she/it end in -s: He/She walks to

school. BUT I/You/We/They walk to school. In negative statements, use doesn't with he/she/it and don't with all the others:

He/She/It doesn't live here. I/You/We/They don't live here.

Don't add -s to the verb: She doesn't live here. (NOT: She doesn't lives here.)



Simple present statements with irregular verbs

I/you/we/they

I have a bike
 We do our homework every day.

he/she/it

My father has a car.
 My mother does a lot of work at home.
