PRESENT SIMPLE

use the present simple to express habits, facts, thoughts and feelings

verb endings: he, she, it

walk	→	walks
ride	→	rides
study	→	studies
watch	→	watches

Present simple

- I work in London.
- She works in London.
- I'm nineteen years old. ...
- I play football every weekend.

EXAMPLE

2

- He works at a car company.
- Mark and Tina like pizza.
- John likes steak.

Irregular verbs

They are words that need other endings than the letter "s".

In general +s	Verbs ending in conson. + y y + ies	Verbs ending in -o, sh, tch, x, ss + es
work → works	study → studies	go → goes
eat → eats	cry → cries	wash → washes
play → plays	try → tries	watch → watches
swim → swims	spy → spies	mix → mixes
write → writes	fly → flies	kiss → kisses

- ▶ In affirmative statements, verbs with he/she/it end in -s: He/She **walks** to school. BUT I/You/We/They **walk** to school.
- ▶ In negative statements, use *doesn't* with he/she/it and *don't* with all the others: He/She/It **doesn't** live here. I/You/We/They **don't** live here.
- ▶ Don't add -s to the verb: She **doesn't live** here. (NOT: She ~~doesn't lives~~ here.)

- Do you play the piano? Where do you live? Does Jack play football? Where does he come from? ...
- Where do Angela and Rita live? What does Angela do? When does Rita usually get up? ...

- ▶ In questions, use *does* with he/she/it and *do* with all the others: **Does** he/she/it get up early? **Do** I/you/we/they get up early?
- ▶ Don't add -s to the verb: Does she **live** alone? (NOT: Does she ~~lives~~ alone?)
