Present Continuous
 Subject + be + verb + -ing
 The baby is walking!
 Are you trying?
 I'm not trying!

is one of the present tenses used in English

If the verb ends in silent e, this letter is removed and the ending -ing is added.

- Verbs that end in double e keep this ending and add -ing to the end.
- Example: I am seeing my lawyer next Monday
- Example: They are dancing cumbias.

	helping verb	base + -ing
I	am	trying
You	are	trying
He/She/it	is	trying
We	are	trying
You	are	trying
They	are	trying

Advance facts, appointments, events or actions that will occur in the future. Whoever speaks must be sure that it will happen.

Present Continuous

I	am	am	am
You	are	are	are
He/She/It	is	is	is
We	are	are	are
You	are	are	are
They	are	are	are

Example: They are going to the zoo next Saturday.

Present Continuous

- Negative: I'm not trying
- Short form: I'mn't trying
- Interrogative: Are you trying?

Describe actions that occur constantly. In these cases, the sentence is reinforced with adverbs such as always, forever, constantly, among others.

Example: The birds are always singing since sunrise
