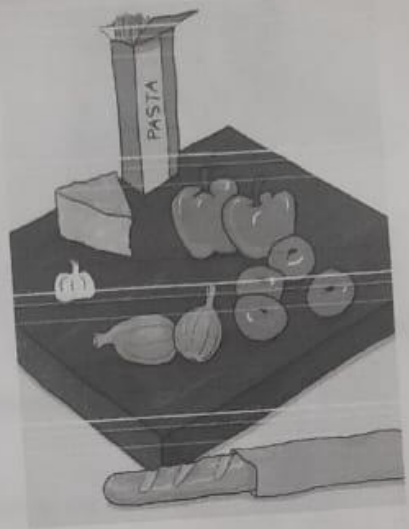

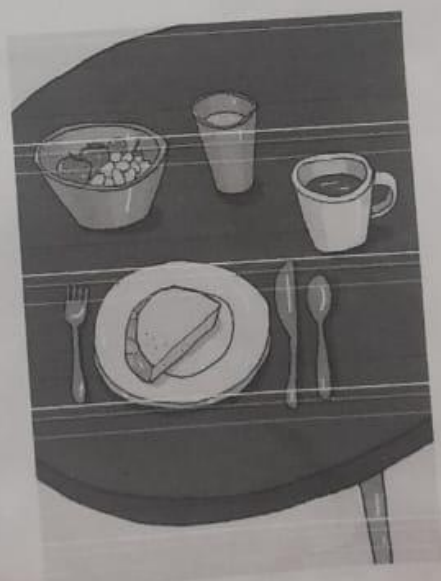
4 Complete the conversations with some or any.
