




IMPORTANT DAYS IN CANADA





Victoria Day is a holiday commemorating the birthday of Queen Victoria, the British monarch, and falls on the Monday before May 24.



Canada Day is a celebration in honor of the anniversary of the founding of the country as an independent state. On July 1, 1867, three English colonies - Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Province of Canada - united and created what it calls "Canadian Confederation".



Ottawa Tylip Festival

Three million flowers bloom in Canada's national capital every May during the Ottawa Tulip Festival. Visitors can admire these brilliant blooms aboard the festival's shuttle service or during a guided tulip tour.



Language

Canada is bilingual, with English and French as official languages. English takes precedence in legal proceedings outside Quebec, and English versions of all statutes serve as the final arbiter in disputes interpretation. While that of native French speakers was just under 24 percent.





Calgary Stampede

The Calgary Stampede is a large rodeo festival held in Alberta for 10 days each summer, usually from July 4-14. It is one of the largest events in Canada and is considered one of the largest outdoor shows in the world.
