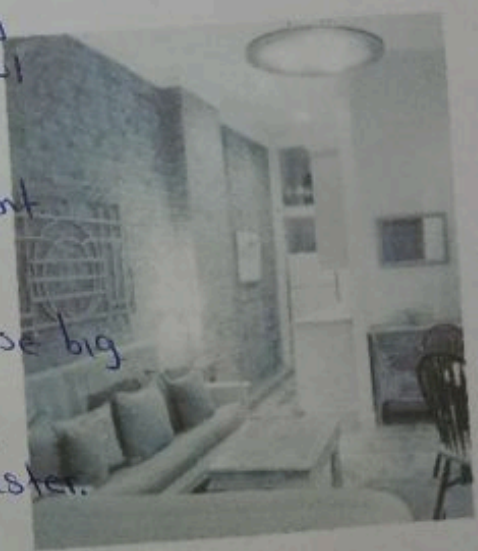

bread

Do we need **any** bread?  
 Yes. Let's get **some** (bread).  
 No. We **don't** need **any** (bread).
