 Adam: All right. Everyone likes potato salad.

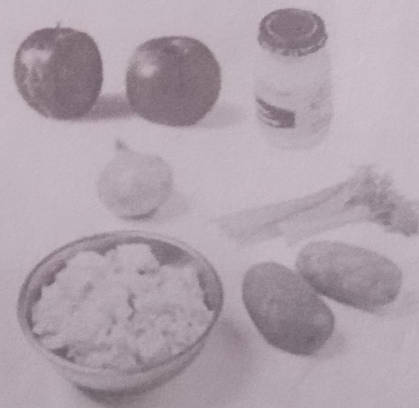
