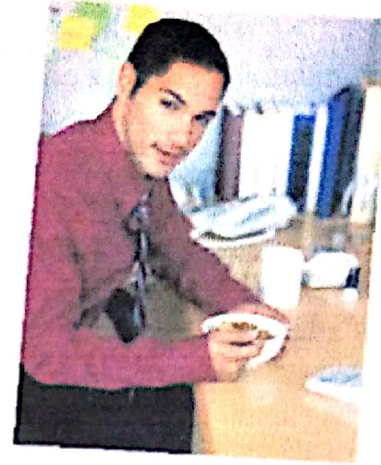

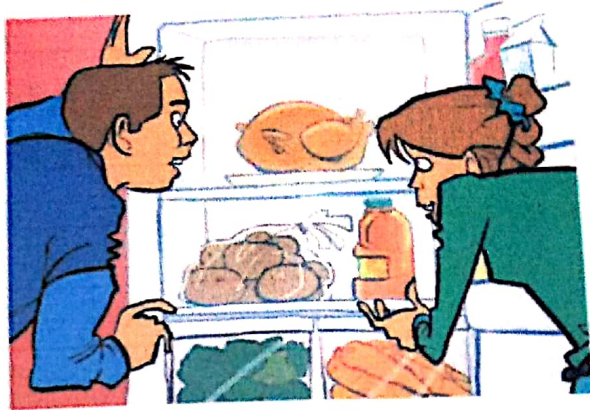

 No. We **don't** need **any** (eggs).

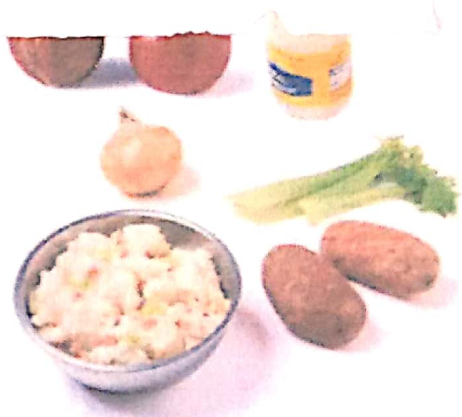
Noncount nouns
