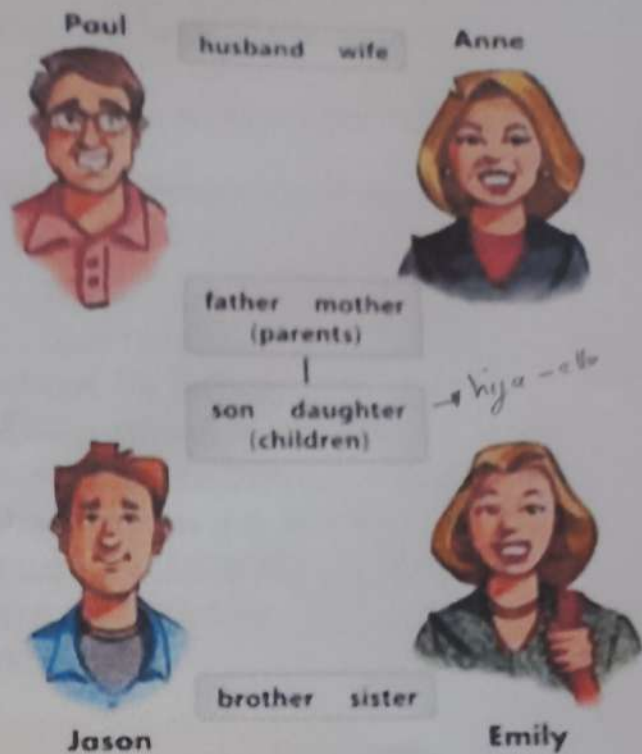

Simple present statements with irregular verbs

and Simple present statements with

- ▶ In affirmative statements, verbs with he/she/it end in -s: He/She **walks** to school. BUT I/You/We/They **walk** to school.
- ▶ In negative statements, use **doesn't** with he/she/it and **don't** with all the others: He/She/It **doesn't** live here. I/You/We/They **don't** live here.
- ▶ Don't add -s to the verb: She **doesn't live** here. (NOT: She doesn't lives here.)

Positive statements – verbs with special forms

With he / she / it (3rd person) the following verbs have a special form in the Simple Present:

Verbs ending in

-O, -CH, -SH, -SS, -X, -Z

We add **-ES**

- I switch → He switches
- We kiss → She kisses

Verbs ending in
a consonant + Y

We add **-IES**

- I try → She tries
- We carry → He carries



NOTE:

For verbs ending with a vowel + Y, we just add **-S**.

- play – plays
- enjoy – enjoys
- say – says
