## ANATOMY

The specific skills acquired with the development of Anatomy are essential and facilitating[1] for the understanding and development of a large part of the subjects of the degree, providing the student with essential instruments on the knowledge of the different structures and components of the human body, its relationship with usual health processes and patterns, allowing the identification of alterations and deviations

## PHYSIOLOGY

In the area of health sciences, knowledge of the normal functioning of the human body is of utmost importance, which allows professionals to have a better development of attitudes and skills in their work environment; Therefore, it is important to strengthen the knowledge bases, starting from the micron to the macro; Thus, cellular physiology is the basis to reinforce and obtain the necessary knowledge to understand the subsequent subjects of the nursing degree, being the basis of all nursing.

## ANESTHESIOLOGY

The main objectives of the nurse's role in general anesthesia are: Provide optimal surgical conditions, whose first objective is the safety and health of the patient; provide hypnosis necessary to perform the surgical intervention and provide analgesia for the surgery.

## PATHOPHYSIOLOGY

It is the foundation of nursing practice, helping to build a solid foundation for a nurse's main responsibilities, such as ordering diagnostic tests, treating acute and chronic illnesses, managing medication, and managing general healthcare and disease prevention for patients and their families

## PHARMACOLOGY

The nurse prepares, administers, detects side effects, educates the population about the rational consumption of drugs and informs patients about the main aspects of the medication that should be known, taking into account a legal responsibility, but above all an ethical one in knowing the actions, indications and contraindications of these substances, so the Knowledge of Pharmacology within this group is essential.
