

Pronouns

Subject personal Pronouns

in the singular:

- For the 1st person: me.
- For the 2nd person: you.
- For the 3rd person there are two forms, one masculine when the subject is a man: he, and another feminine when the subject is a woman: she.

While in plural all these pronouns have masculine and feminine forms:

- For the 1st person: we / us.
- For the 2nd person -> you.
- For the 3rd person -> they / them.

Object Pronouns

Object pronoun Traducción

- Me Me, mí
- You Te, ti
- Him Él, lo, se
- Her Lo, se, ella
- It Lo, se
- Us Nosotros, nos
- You Vosotros, vos
- Them Los, ellos

Example:

- I gave him my pen. (Le di mi bolígrafo).
- I like it. (Me gusta (eso)).
- Don't call me again, please. (No me llames otra vez, por favor).

Possesive adjectives

- 1st person singular (I) – mine(s) or mine(s) and its short form: my(s).
- 2nd person singular (you) – yours or yours and its short form: your(s).
- 3rd person singular (she/him) – his (s) or hers (s) and the short form of her: hers (s).
- 1st person plural (we) – our(s) or our(s).
- 2nd person plural (you) – yours or yours and its short form: your(s).
- 3rd person plural (they/them) – yours or yours and its short form: your(s).

Example sentences that use possessive adjectives:

- My mother is going to stop by your house.
- I need a favor from you.
- What I do with my money is my business.

Possesive Pronouns.

Possessive pronouns in the grammatical persons of the singular

- They are: mine, mine, mine, mine, yours, yours, yours, yours, theirs, theirs, theirs and theirs.

Possessive pronouns in grammatical plural persons

- They are: ours, ours, ours, ours, yours, yours, yours, yours, theirs, theirs and theirs.

- I like your house, but I prefer to sleep in mine.

- I left my shoes at home, can I use yours?
- Will we watch the game at your house or mine?
