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The function and image of the nursing staff have been the target of several transformations, since like other professionals, it is based on the social and humanized concept. The development of this has been modified and is in permanent change, its development has been through a practice of care based on empirical knowledge, since its value has been determined by certain dogmatic ideologies that are included in traditional morality and based models. in self-denial and sacrifice.

If a specialist doctor prescribes some type of medication that the patient must take or that must be administered in a hospital or clinic, the general nurse is responsible for this. The doctor sends a medication administration request to the general nurse, who, in turn, will verify that there are no drug interactions with other medications that the patient is taking at that time and that the indicated dose coincides with the hospital's treatment guidelines. and then apply the medication in accordance with the instructions. With respect to hospitalized patients, the general nurse administers all medications required by the patient throughout the day and night, following a strict schedule to ensure timely and accurate dosing to maintain health and ensure patient comfort. To achieve this, the general nurse must collaborate closely with the treating physician(s) and pharmacy staff of the institution. In many hospitals and clinics, general nurses play a leading role in primary patient care. Doctors work with general nurses to plan and implement a program of care for patients based on each person's individual response to a specific treatment. Based on this, general nurses will assume the comprehensive care of patients in their area of care. When a general nurse notices that a patient's condition does not improve after initiating a specific treatment or therapy, he or she should communicate his or her assessment to the patient's treating physician and recommend feasible changes to the care plan. Patient records are essential for proper medical care. Thorough and clear records enable healthcare professionals to provide superior quality care. Likewise, they help the changing of nursing staff shifts to be carried out without setbacks and without harming the patient. Every time a general nurse examines a patient, checks their mood and physical status, administers medications, or helps them with basic hygiene tasks, they must record these activities thoroughly. This is vital, since the patient's history is often the key to identifying the most appropriate treatment and intolerances that could harm the patient's health. Every time a nurse is in contact with the patient, he or she must measure and record vital signs such as blood pressure, temperature, and heart rate. These are clear indicators of the patient's condition at that time. If a patient has high blood pressure, outside of normal ranges, it may be an indication that the patient is feeling distressed or in severe pain.

Or if a particular patient has an acute fever, it may indicate that the person most likely has an infection. General nurses are those who hold patients' hands during a painful medical procedure and who reassure patients who refuse to be treated. Therefore, general nurses must have the emotional strength to offer empathy and solidarity to patients and their families.
