# SIMPLE PRESENT TENSE

Verbal tense, which serves to describe habitual actions, general facts, universal truths and permanent situations.

Negative (-)

Sujeto + auxiliar do/does  
not + verbo + Complemento

Afirmative (+)

Sujeto + verbo + Complemento

Interrogative (?)

Auxiliar do/des + Sujeto + verbo + Complemento.

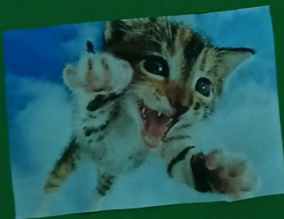
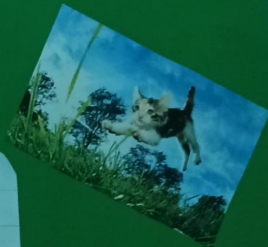
## Rules

- In the person singular, the verb always ends in -s.
- When verbs end in "o, sh, ch, x and z" you must add -es to the end.
- For the negative and interrogative forms, we use Does (third person auxiliary y 'Do') + the informative of the verb.
- Verbs ending in -y: in the third person singular, the y is changed to -ies. Exception when a vowel precedes the -y.

## Example



- + Your cat can jump between trees.
- Your cat can not jump between trees.
- ? Can your cat jump between trees?
