

Some: It is used in affirmative sentences and in educational questions or when offering something

Example

Affirmative: I have some friends in london. (Tengo algunos amigos en Londres.)

Interrogative: Would you like some coffee? (¿Te gustaría un poco de café?)



Any: It is used in negative sentences and in general questions.

Example

Negative: I don't have any money." (No tengo dinero.)

Interrogative: Do you have any questions? (¿Tienes alguna pregunta?)

SHORT ANSWER
Yes, I/You/He/She/etc. **can**.
No, I/You/He/She/etc. **cannot**.

USE

ABILITY
→ Laura **can** sing very well.
→ I **can't** speak German.

→ Can I have a soda, please?
