SOME/ANY

SOME vs ANY

SOME

- Used to mean "a little" and "a few".
- Used with both countable and uncountable nouns.
- Used with countable nouns, nouns are plural, used with uncountable nouns, they are always singular.

Examples

- I must withdraw some money from the bank.
- Lyn sent some pictures from the wedding.
- He has bought some tropical fruits.

ANY

- Used to mean "no" or "zero".
- Used with both countable and uncountable nouns.
- Used with countable nouns, they are always plural, used with uncountable nouns, they always become singular.

Examples

- The baby can't keep any food down.
- You can't go out without any shoes.
- I won't give her any more if she's ungrateful.

Which

• Asking about choice.

• Asking about quantity.

How often

• Asking about frequency.
• How often do you go swimming?

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CAN/CAN'T



CAN - CANNOT

USES OF CAN

Simple Present Tense

- ability or possibility
- I can swim.
- permission
- You can use my pen.

CAN + VERB * Base form of the infinitive
He can speak English. ✓
He can speaks English. ✗ No S
He can to speak English. ✗ No TO

AFFIRMATIVE

I can speak English.
You can ride a bike.
He can drive a car.
She can play the guitar.
It can swim.

NEGATIVE

I can't speak French.
You can't ride a horse.
He can't drive a truck.
She can't play the piano.
It can't fly.

PLURAL

We can play football.
You can see the stars.
They can dance.

NEGATIVE

We can't play tennis.
You can't see germs.
They can't sing.

QUESTIONS

Affirmative They can speak Spanish.

Question Can they speak Spanish?

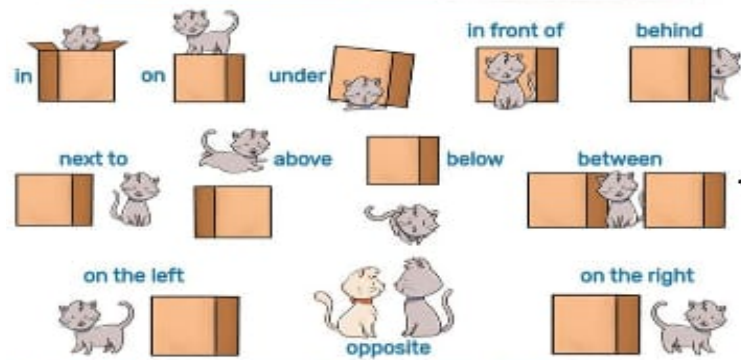
Short Answer Yes, they can. / No, they can't.

CONTRACTION

can't = cannot

He can't sing.
= He cannot sing.
