

Uncountable things are things that are considered a whole or a mass and cannot be counted as individual items.


Some / any.



Adverbs of frequency.



- Adverbs of frequency are words that describe how often an action happens. For example, you might say "I always go to the cinema at the weekend".
- Examples of adverbs of frequency always, usually, often, sometimes, rarely, never, frequently, occasionally, normally, and regularly.

• Subject + verb to be + adverb of frequency + complement.

Susan is always happy.

Negative.

• Subject + verb to be + not + adverb of frequency + complement. Nick is not usually in México.

Verb to be + subject + adverb of frequency + complement?
 Is Peter usually sick?

Af in present simple.

Affirmative.

Subject + adverb of frequency + verb + complement.
 They often meet friends and have adrink togetter.

Negative.

Subject + don't doesn't + adverb of frequency + verb + complement.

Sara doesn't always go aut on saturday evenings.

Interrogative.

Do Does + subject + adverb of frequency + verb + complement.
 Does she usually call her Mother.

Can for ability.

Can / can't.

Subject + can , can't + verb + complement.
