- there aren't any chairs.

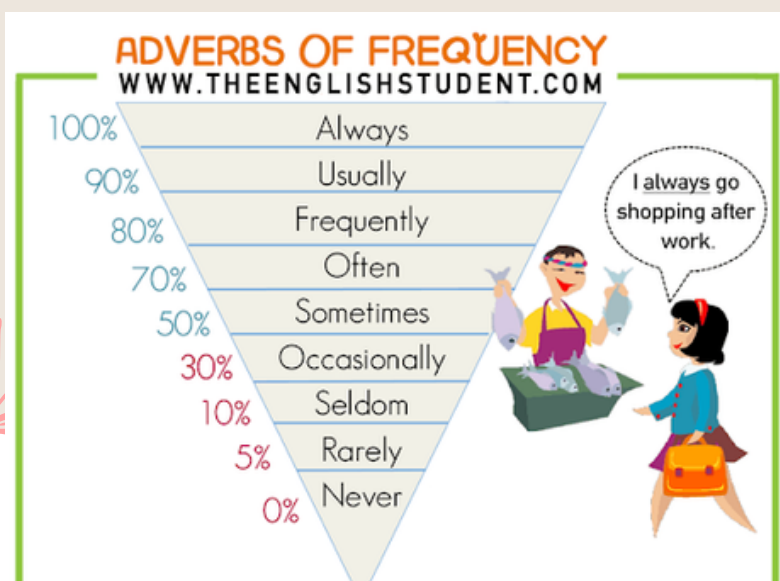


Interrogative.

Adverbs of frequency.



- Adverbs of frequency are words that describe how often an action happens. For example, you might say "I always go to the cinema at the weekend".

- Examples of adverbs of frequency
always, usually, often, sometimes, rarely, never, frequently, occasionally, normally, and regularly.

- Subject + verb to be + adverb of frequency + complement.
Susan is always happy.

Negative.

- Subject + verb to be + not + adverb of frequency + complement.
Nick is not usually in México.

Interrogative.

- Verb to be + subject + adverb of frequency + complement?
Is Peter usually sick?

● Af in present simple.

Affirmative.

- Subject + adverb of frequency + verb + complement.
They often meet friends and have a drink together.

Negative.

Subject + don't doesn't + adverb of frequency + verb + complement.
Sara doesn't always go out on Saturday evenings.

Interrogative.

- Do Does + subject + adverb of frequency + verb + complement.
Does she usually call her Mother.
