Countable nouns name things you can count:

- Apples.

Uncountable nouns name things you can't count:

- · Spinach.

- Fish. · Chicken.
- Milk. • Yogurt.
- · Cereal.

- Nuts
- · Oil.
- Noodles. · Rice.

Some and any

Countable nouns have singular and plural forms:

- Singular forms: use a/an.
- Plural forms: use some/any.

Use "Some" in affirmative sentences.

· We have some chicken.

Use "Any" in negative sentences and questions.

- · We don't have any bread.
- Do we have any cheese?

Adverbs of frequency


- Always.Almost always.Usually.
- Often. 70%
- Sometimes.Almost never / Rarely.
- Hardly ever.
 - Never.

Usually come before the main verb:

- She never plays tennis.
- I almost always eat breakfast.

Sometimes can begin a sentence:

Sometimes I eat breakfast.



Adverbs of Frequency



Can for ability.

Use the base form of the verb with can.

With the third-person singular, don't add an -s to can or to the base form.

She can play the piano. (Not: she can plays the piano)

I can cook	I can not / can't cook	Can I cook?	Yes, you can / No, you can't
You can dance	You can not / can't dance	Can you dance?	Yes I can / No I can't
He can play	He can not / can't play	Can he play?	Yes, he can / No, he can't
She can swim	She can not / can't swim	Can she swim?	Yes, she can / No, she can't
It can run	It can not / can't run	Can it run?	Yes, it can / No, it can't
We can sing	We can not / can't sing	Can we sing?	Yes, we can / No, we can't
