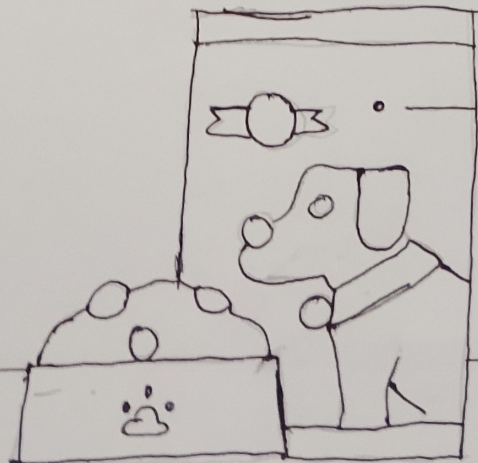


6. Role of veterinarians in food safety

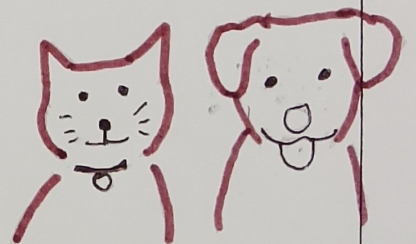
9. Why is it important?
